During the 1999-2000 season, Mr. Jasperse created two works for other companies: a work commissioned by the Baryshnikov Dance Foundation for White Oak's Dance Project and a work commissioned by the Batsheva Dance Company in Tel Aviv, Israel. Mr. Jasperse's choreographic work has been supported by fellowships from John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation (1998), the National Endowment for the Arts (1992, 1994,1995-96) and the New York Foundation for the Arts (1988 and 1994). Upcoming projects include the development of a new evening-length work for John Jasperse Company co-commissioned by Ballett Frankfurt, the Portland Institue of Contemporary Art and the Brooklyn Academy of Music's Next Wave Festival 2001 and a commission from the Lyon Opera Ballet for 2001-2002.
