And now for a Kitchen update: Despite the recent unexpected cuts from the NEA (\$53,200 that is used for artists' fees and production expenses March to March each year), The Kitchen continues to prevail. Anna Deavere Smith, a renowned artist and new Board member, hosted a benefit performance of her new piece Twilight: Los Angeles 1992 on April 2 at the Public Theatre. Paula Cooper, Chairman of our Board of Directors, hosted a reception in honor of Anna Deavere Smith at her gallery in SoHo.

This season has been filled with activity. We opened a new video annex called Kitchenette at Thread Waxing Space in SoHo. Thread Waxing Space is a vital new visual art and performance space focused on many of the same principles of openness and collaboration that have fueled The Kitchen for 23 years. We look forward to developing a creative partnership with these young visionaries. Please join us at Kitchenette on May 17 for the next opening — a video piece by Ken Kobland titled Flaubert Dreams of Travel But Thelliness Of His Mother Prevents It.

We also spent time refurbishing our two theater spaces. The Harlem Victoria V Theater donated the cushioned seats that were installed in our first floor theater. Our production staff also built a technical booth on the second floor. As many of you already know, we now have a second floor studio theater dedicated to intimate performance and particularly to the development of new work by emerging artists.

Thank you for your support of Blondell Cummings and we hope to see you again here at The Kitchen.

For J.B. is a full evening-length work inspired by the spirit and life of Josephine Baker (1906-1975). Ms. Baker was an African American performance artist who became the toast of Paris in the late 1920's and early 1930's, admired for her innovative performance style and bold humanitarianism.

## Harlem on My Mind (1994)

Harlem on My Mind is an audience interactive improvisational solo about growing up in Harlem. Ms. Cummings invites the audience to assist her creative process by suggesting words or ideas as material for its development. Harlem on My Mind will eventually be developed into a full evening-length work.

**BLONDELL CUMMINGS** (choreographer/performer) was an original member of Meredith Monk/The House and was seen in Philip Glass' *The Photographer - Far From The Truth*, directed by JoAnne Akalaitis. In 1978, Ms. Cummings founded Cycle Arts Foundation. The Foundation is a multi-disciplinary arts collaborative incorporating dance, theater, visual, media and literary arts. This is manifested through workshops, media, and performance.

Ms. Cummings tours extensively throughout the United States, Europe and Asia. She has performed at Lincoln Center, La MaMa ETC, The Joyce Theatre, Dance Theater Workshop, Spoleto Festival, The Public Theater, P.S. 122, and at international festivals in France, Austria, Switzerland, London, Germany. Other solo and group work includes: The Relationship Series, Basic Strategies I through V, The Art of War, Passing Images, He Searched From Wall to Wall, Food For Thought, A Friend I & II, The Ladies and Me, Cycle, Collette, 3B49.

Blondell Cummings' work *Commitment - Two Portraits* premiered nationally on "Alive From Off-Center" on PBS in 1988 and was featured on the cover of The New York Times Television Magazine. She was a featured artist in Elle Magazine and was one of the performers highlighted in ADF's "African American Genius of Modern Dance." Michael Blackwood's film "Dancing on the Edge" profiled Ms. Cummings and her work. She is a recipient of numerous fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts, The New York Foundation for the Arts, the Jerome Foundation, and a land grant from the Harkness Center Foundation. Ms. Cummings has spent residencies in Japan on grants from the U.S.-Japan Friendship Commission and the Asian Cultural Council.

Currently Ms. Cummings is working on the collaborative project *Women in the Dunes* based on the film and novel of the same title by Kobe Abe. This work is scheduled for Ms. Cummings' New York Season 1995. Japanese dancer Junko Kikuchi will collaborate on the project. The work features music by composer Deidre Murray commissioned by Ms. Cummings through a Meet The Composer grant.

Ms. Cummings has taught extensively throughout the United States and has held numerous international positions. Through USIA, Ms. Cummings has taught and lectured in Japan, the Philippines and Mauritius. In the States, her teaching credits include: Cornell University, NYU, Wesleyan, Hofstra and City College faculty and Lincoln Center Institute for the Performing Arts. Ms. Cummings has conducted numerous dance/theater workshops and residencies at various colleges and universities throughout the U.S. and abroad.

LAURA MARCHESE (rehearsal director/performer) first worked with Blondell on the original development of Act 2 of For J.B. in Washington D.C. in March '92. Since then Laura has worked as Rehearsal Director on a subsequent version of the piece at the Flynn Theatre in Vermont and has also enjoyed working with Blondell as Assistant Choreographer on the Like Family project in residency at Duke University in North Carolina and at Hofstra University. Other credits include The Janet Gerson Dance Company, The Doris Humphrey Repertory Dance Company (soloist), and the companies of Pearl Lang and Lynn Parkerson. Laura's choreography has been seen in NY at the 92nd Street Y, Soundance, SUNY Purchase, The Martha Graham Center for Contemporary Dance, and in residencies in upstate NY and Long Island. Other recent choreography includes Coed Prison Sluts: The Musical which ran for 14 months in the West Village, and Unaccompanied, the first collaboration of Laura and fellow company member David M. Sharp. Laura teaches at the Dance Center at the 92nd Street Y, and lives in NYC with her husband Michael.

JOHN FUNK (performer) was born in Pennsylvania and raised in San Antonio, Texas. He attended California Institute of the Arts on scholarship and currently lives in New York City. He has danced four seasons with the Los Angeles Chamber Ballet and was nominated for a Lester Horton Dance Award for his performance in Laurence Blake's Tunnel. He has performed with J. Fregalette Jansen Dance at The Kitchen in New York City and with Blondell Cummings For J.B. at the Flynn Theatre in Vermont. Musical theater credits include Kiss Me Kate at Augusta Opera and The Music Man at the Fiesta Dinner Playhouse. He performed the role of Orion, a dog in Broadway Arts' production of Somebody Come and Play and recently played the role of Big Deal in Virginia Opera's West Side Story.

KIM GRIER (Josephine Baker) is a native New Yorker who received her BFA in Dance from the Philadelphia College of Performing Arts. She has worked with the East/West Repertory Ensemble, Soundance, Consort Dance Co., Inner Pulsations Dance Theatre, Danny Sloan Dance Co., Wylliams Dance Co., David Rousseve and Dancers, and Forces of Nature. Her television credits include City Lights, Visions, and Evening Magazine. Besides her featured solo work with RRDC and her role as director in the Rodgers' Co. Performing Workshop, Kim is on staff at the Harlem School of the Arts and a member of the resident company RAE Dance. She also choreographed an Off-Broadway production The Dark Star from Harlem, and made her debut at The Metropolitan Opera House as a principal dancer in George Gershwin's Porgy and Bess, choreographed by Carmen de Lavallade, and is currently studying with Tee Ross and Milton Meyers.

ROBERT KAMP (Guiseppe) grew up in Nebraska where he started dancing at the age of 5. After receiving his BFA in Dance from Stephens College. Bob spent three years in Philadelphia Civic Ballet and various independent choreographers including Lucas Hoving. He then spent a year in Pittsburgh dancing with the Dance Alloy with whom he toured Eastern Europe. He has performed in many musicals and outdoor theaters. He would like to thank his wife Patti and his family for all of their constant love an support.

**DAVID MAURICE SHARP** (performer) was in Burlington VT last summer with Blondell Cummings working on *For J.B.* He has also danced for Lucinda Childs, Sean Curran, Mimi Garrard, Rachel Lampert, Heidi Latsky, Lonne Moretton, and Anna Sokolow among others. David holds a BFA from NYU's Tisch School of the Arts and is currently collaborating with fellow company member Laura Marchese.

ELLEN E. BONE (stage manager) has stage managed for Jonathon Hollander and Battery Dance Company here in New York, and had the unique experience of accompanying Chandrasekhar Nrityashree Dance Company on their United States premiere tour. She is also known in dance and theater for her lighting designs.

TONY GIOVANNETTI (lighting designer) designed the lighting for Blondell Cummings' piece Cycle many years ago and finds this completion to be interesting as well as satisfying. Most recently he has designed lights for Sara Pearson at DTW, Ann Carlson at The Joyce, and new work with Meredith Monk at Merkin Hall and P.S. 122. He has worked for many years with Dancing in the Streets doing their site-specific events, lastly Martha Bowers' epic dance work on the Red Hook Piers. He works at the Metropolitan Opera as Electric Consultant head, involved in new productions, scenery and special effects construction, and scenery automation.

MICHAEL MAZZOLA (lighting designer) is the 1992 recipient of the New York Dance and Performance Awards in the Visual Design Category in the field of Lighting Design. His lighting can be seen in the repertories of the Bebe Miller Company, Blondell Cummings, Southern Ballet Theatre, Oregon Ballet Theatre, Bill Young and Dancers, Yoshiko Chuma and the School of Hard Knocks, Irene Hultman and the Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble among others.

Through workshops, performance, panel discussions and family albums/portraits, the participants define what "family" means to them.
