"Dancing In The Kitchen" begins its 1978–79 season with "Get Wreck", dances by Andy deGroat with music by Michael Galasso and songs by Christopher Knowles, September 12–16 at 8:30pm. "Get Wreck" is a suite of eight dances for one to twelve dancers choreographed by Andy de Groat, consisting of solos for Frank Conversano, Dana Reitz and Garry Reigenborn and five ensemble dances. Classically based music by Michael Galasso for horn and string ensemble of six musicians will be performed live. The program is approximately one hour long.

The full company includes Ritty Ann Burchfield, Robin Colyer, Frank Conversano, Andy de Groat, Gail Donnenfeld, Michael Kuhling, Daniel Lambert, Godot Pinheiro, Kathy Ray, Garry Reigenborn, Dana Reitz, Harry Sheppard and Angie Smit.

The ensemble dances include: a dance of tightly structured steps, performed in silence, such that the dancers footfalls act as their own percussive accompaniment; an ensemble of simultaneous solos; a scherzo of baroque solo, partnering and ensemble variations accompanied by a chorus reciting a song-poem by Christopher Knowles; a fan dance of geometric, interwoven walking steps and port de bras.

Andy de Groat has choreographed Robert Wilson's "A Letter For Queen Victoria" and the Wilson/Glass opera, "Einstein On The Beach", which toured Europe and gave final performances at the Metropolitan Opera. He has presented his choreography in concert at the Brooklyn Academy of Music and Pace University in New York, the Walker Art Center in Minneapolis, the International Festival of Dance, the American Center, Theater Recamier and the Autumn Festival in Paris, and the Festival of Arts in Shiraz, Iran.
