Notes on the bunny

People always ask, "where did that title come from, 'dumb dumb bunny'?" The answer is it doesn't come from anything. Rather, I think of a mute, soft creature that doesn't often stand a chance in a harsh environment. How does it get by? Will it adapt, is it capable of adapting? A lot of times it just doesn't work: mute, soft, inept creature dies. And worse, nobody notices.

There's a beautiful, pristine lake we often go to upstate. One weekend last summer we were there early so it was still and quiet for a bit and then the riff-raff showed up. Two things: Tourette's Girl showed up--an incredibly short and obese girl--made me wonder if drugs had induced that impossibly proportioned body, and Golden Amputee Boy showed up. But Golden Amputee Boy wasn't really an amputee. A fit and tan adolescent, he just missed lower arms. Instead, withered, dead fingers dangled from his stumps. Two for each arm.

It didn't matter. You could tell by the spatial proximity of all the others that he was beyond reproach, he was golden. He had convinced them.

I was on a rocky outcropping on a high diagonal away from the swimming area, trying to read, but no such luck. I was too busy watching--there were some bunnies down there and they were contending with the elements.

About the artists

Sam Kim makes dances that draw attention to the margins of culture and behavior, creating space for vulnerability while courting danger. Since 2002, Sam has created a series of long works: AVATAR (2006), Nobody Understands Me (2004), Placid Baby (2003), and Valentine (2002). Her most recent work, Cult (2007), premiered at Dance Theater Workshop last April for The Nothing Festival curated by Tere O'Connor.

Her work has been presented and commissioned by Dance Theater Workshop, Performance Space 122, Danspace Project at St. Mark's Church, and The Kitchen, in addition to other progressive venues such as Studio 303 (Montréal), the Brooklyn Museum, and Galapagos Art and Performance Space, among others. Sam is the recipient of awards from organizations like The Rockefeller Foundation/Multi-Arts Production (MAP) Fund, the Bossak/Heilbron Charitable Foundation, Movement Research, the Brooklyn Arts Exchange, and the 92nd St. Y Harkness Dance Center. She is currently an Artist-in-Residence at the Brooklyn Arts Exchange.

Sam recently collaborated with artist Ryan McNamara on an unnamed video project by providing 'drunk geriatric,' 'paranoid disco,' and 'statue coming down through the ages,' various choreographic scores used in *dumb dumb bunny*. Sam and Ryan have decided it's inevitable—they will be collaborating on another longer film or video project.

Sam's next work, *JONES*, a crisp bludgeony work about body panic, will be seen June 20-22 at the Brooklyn Arts Exchange.

Last fall, Sam launched her brainchild workshop, *Real Feedback*, a choreographic workshop that enables participants to see their dances better within a progressive context, at Movement Research. Sam is also a member of the Board at Dance Theater Workshop.

As a performer, Sam has worked with a number of downtown experimentalists including Jennifer Monson, Susan Rethorst, and DD Dorvillier. Sam was also a member of Sarah Skaggs Dance and Li Chiao-Ping Dance, among others.

Sam's parents immigrated to the States from Korea shortly after she was born, eventually settling in New Brighton, Minnesota. When she was 17, a hardcore bunhead visionary told her she had genuine talent. Sam ran with it. In 1991 she moved to NYC to go to Barnard where she earned a B.A. in English. She began making dances at 19. She is now a choreographer and performer based in Brooklyn.

Michael Helland loves to make dances and stuff like dances. While studying Community & Environmental Planning and Dance at the University of Washington he began exploring the role of live performance in contemporary society and has been developing a unique body of work that addresses the human body in relation to the communal body. As a Brooklyn-based dance artist, originally from Seattle, his choreographic work has been presented in venues across New York City and beyond, including Brooklyn Arts Exchange, The Chocolate Factory, Dance Theater Workshop, Danspace Project, and Studio 303 (Montreal). Michael also curates Brink, a quarterly performance series at Dixon Place, and has performed a lot with robbinschilds and Daniel Linehan. www.myspace.com/michaelhelland Thank you!!!

Liz Santoro received her early dance training at Boston Ballet School and graduated from Harvard University with a BA. Since arriving in New York in 2003 she has created her own works and performed in those of Jack Ferver, Beth Gill, Jillian Peña, Emily Wexler, and Ann Liv Young. In addition to being a certified pilates instructor, Liz teaches myofascial lengthening techniques through the MELTTM Method. She wishes to thank the dance community in this city and beyond for continually amazing her.

Miriam Wolf is a dancer, choreographer, and Thai masseuse living in Brooklyn. Her first structured dance experience came from a children's dance company that focused on such topics as nuclear war, birth and death, and popcorn. In 2003 she graduated from SUNY Purchase with a BFA in dance. Since than she has collaborated and performed for Natalie Green, Daniel Linehan, Michael Helland/The New Ugly, Anna Carapetyan, SYREN Dance, Stacy Grossfield, and Juliette Mapp. As a choreographer her work has been presented in New York at Cunningham Dance Theatre, St. Mark's Church, Triskelion Arts, and LaMaMa, as well as internationally. Rosenblum. She is the Finance Associate at Danspace Project, has served as Producer for the Chelsea Cultural Partnership, and always gives a shout out to the good folks at Movement Research.

Milka Djordjevich is originally from Long Beach, California, and now lives in Brooklyn. She attended UCLA where she performed and studied with a number of dance artists including Simone Forti, Dan Froot, Victoria Marks, and Nina Martin. In 2003, Milka relocated to New York to attend the MFA program at Sarah Lawrence College. Since graduating, her choreography has been shown at various venues in NYC including Movement Research at Judson Church, Starr Street Projects, BAX, and this December at Danspace Project's Food for Thought. She recently performed with Jennifer Monson and Natalie Green and is a 2006-2007 Movement Research Artist-in-Resident.

Erika Eichelberger is originally from northern California. She danced with Oakland Ballet in high school and then studied English and French at Barnard and UCLA. Since moving back to New York she has worked with Noemie LaFrance and Eun Hee Lee, and is also currently working with Shira Pelleg and Milka Djordjevich.

Sharon Estacio, a native of New York, has performed across the U.S. and internationally since 1999. Estacio has also been commissioned to create new work by Aaron Davis Hall (2001), Mulberry Street Theater with the Jerome Foundation (2004), and Lower Manhattan Cultural Council (2006). Currently she works with Clare Byrne (2003-), has done projects for dancegang and was a member of the Doug Elkins Dance Company (2000-2003). Mimi Lien has been designing sets/environments for theatre, dance, opera, and film since defecting from the field of architecture ten years ago. She was born in New Haven, CT and currently lives and works in New York City. Recent work includes: The Bald Soprano (Shakespeare Theater of NJ), The Life of Galileo (Wilma Theater), Carmina Burana (Pennsylvania Ballet), A.R Gurney's Post Mortem (Flea), Love Unpunished (Pig Iron), and Sir Isaac's Apples (Juilliard Dance). Her work has been presented at The Joyce Theater, Dance Theater Workshop, Juilliard, Williamstown Theatre Festival, Berkshire Theater Festival, Chautauqua Theater Company, Princeton University/McCarter Theater Center, NY Summer Play Festival, and Symphony Space, among others. Since coming to New York in 1983, Michael Stiller has created lighting designs for Yvonne Meier, Ishmael Houston-Jones, Jennifer Monson, DANCENOISE, Yoshiko Chuma, Sam Kim, Richard Elovich, Cathy Weis, David Rousseve, Ron Brown, Irene Hultman, and Tere O'Connor--to name a few. His work has been seen in venues of all shapes and sizes, from the Mulberry Street Theater in lower Manhattan to Lincoln Center to Opera houses in Europe and South America. In 1991, Michael began his longtime collaboration with Neil Greenberg, and in 1994 he won a New York Dance and Performance Award (Bessie) in recognition of his design for Mr. Greenberg's Not About Aids Dance. From 1986-1992, Michael worked as a staff designer at The Danspace Project at St Marks Church, and from 1988-1990, he curated Reel Time, Performance Space 122's bi-monthly evening of experimental film. Along with his continuing participation in the dance community, most notably with Neil Greenberg and Sam Kim, Michael currently works as a commercial designer, creating lighting and media environments for television, feature films, and live concerts. Over the past year he has expanded the scope of his practice to include permanent architectural installations, including a museum space for Motorola at their corporate headquarters just outside of Chicago.

Stephen Cooper is a composer, musician, sound engineer, and performance artist from Long Island, currently residing in Brooklyn. He graduated from SUNY Purchase's Conservatory of Music, where he studied under composer/conductor Joel Thome, with a B.A. in studio composition. He was a recipient of American Music Center's Live Music For Dance grant in 2007 for the creation of a new work with Josh Bisset/SHUA group. Stephe is a member of Eagle Ager, the Schmendricks, and No Snakes Quartet and has made work for mediums including chamber ensembles, rock bands, klezmer ensemble, sound collage, (puppet) musicals, electronic, and music for dance, film, and theater/performance.
