AT THE KITCHEN THROUGH FEBRUARY 10 In Perlin's film Transcript, two actors portray a slightly jittery fifties couple chatting over dinner. The reason for their paranoia? As they eat, they're being recorded by the FBI. (Perlin's project is drawn from real-life recently declassified transcripts and tapes.) An accompanying film loop, Inaudible, points up an even more troubling part of the story. It's made up of muffled words and phrases that the Feds didn't quite catch, allowing them to take their best guesseswith which they could prosecute Americans all the same.
