Trajal Harrell:

Twenty Looks or Paris is Burning at The Judson Church February 9–13, times vary

Choreographer Trajal Harrell's project Twenty Looks or Paris is Burning at The Judson Church is the culmination of a decade-long inquiry into the parallel histories of postmodern dance and the voguing dance form. Rather than illustrating a historical fiction, each work in the series transports this imagined scenario into a contemporary context to address the shifting relationship of movement to site, class, and identity as well as to comment on how contemporary dance is created, scaled, distributed, and consumed. *In choreographic collaboration with Cecilia Bengolea, François Chaignaud, and Marlene Freitas.

Ellie Ga: The Fortunetellers February 16, 7pm

The Fortunetellers is an autobiographical, narrative performance based on a five-month residency the artist Ellie Ga spent on the Tara, a research sallboat frozen into the ice, purposely drifting near the North Pole to gather scientific data. Combining a vast array of documents she created and archived along the way (photographs, videos, annotated sketches, maps, travel logs), Ga superimposes live storytelling, recorded sound, still and moving images, to conjure up the terms and rituals of daily life in the Arctic night while incorporating fragments of one of the rare entertainment forms the artist and the other nine crew members of the expedition managed to create for themselves in their remote, confined habitat: a lecture series.

Brent Green: Gravity was Everywhere Back Then February 17–18, 8pm

Inspired by the real actions of the eccentric Leonard Wood, filmmaker **Brent Green** brings to life this love story like no other in his first feature-length film. Shot entirely on the full-scale town he built in his backyard, Green combines animation, stop-motion, and live-action in an ethereal opus to lovers and tinkerers everywhere. The Fortunetellers

The Fortunetellers, an autobiographical, narrative lecture, is based on the five-months Ellie Ga spent aboard Tara, a research sailboat frozen into the ice near the North Pole. Tara had been inserted into the ice in Eastern Siberia, at which point her rudders were lifted out, her engines were shut off and she drifted solely with the movement of the pack ice. Owing to Tara's unique construction, the boat was able to withstand the pressure of the ice compression – becoming the second boat in recorded polar history to purposefully drift through the frozen Arctic ocean. The expedition obtained the highest northern point for a drifting vessel (88°32'N) and collected valuable data for the study of climate change. Ga was the only artist invited to join the expedition, boarding for what would be the last winter and the release from the ice.

It was during an 18-month residency in the archives of the New York Explorers Club that Ellie Ga became fascinated with the Arctic. Ga was particularly interested in the incomplete paper trails of reportage and documentation that reflect the imperfection of memory of historical explorations. The logical conclusion of this research was to eventually be part of an expedition herself.

In *The Fortunetellers* incorporates a vast array of documents (photographs, videos, annotated sketches, maps, travel log...) and superimposes live storytelling and recorded sound to conjure up the terms and rituals of daily life in the Arctic night.

Biography

Combining genres such as the memoir, the travelogue and the documentary, Ellie Ga's projects explore the limits of photographic documentation and span a variety of media, often incorporating her exploratory writing and culminating in performative lectures, videos and installations. Ellie Ga was born in 1976 in New York City and completed her MFA in 2004 at Hunter College. Her work has been exhibited in New York at Bureau and The Swiss Institute, Galerie du Jour, Paris and Hong Kong, Konstmuseum, Malmö, Sweden and Projekt 0047 in Oslo, Norway. She has presented performative lectures at the RISO-Museo d'Arte Contemporanea, Sicily, Institute for Cultural Inquiry, Berlin, Bétonsalon, Paris, and in New York City at PS1 and for the Edifying Series. Upcoming projects include a solo exhibition at Milliken Gallery, Stockholm and performances at the Power Plant, Toronto and Espace Culturel Louis Vuitton, Paris. She is a founding member of Ugly Duckling Presse and currently lives in Brooklyn.

Briggan Krauss with Raha Raissnia: Cosmography February 25–26, 8pm

This latest audio-visual project between long-time collaborators saxophonist, composer, and sound artist Briggan Krauss and abstract painter and film artist Raha Raissnia features all new music for Krauss's stellar trio H-alpha (Ikue Mori on Japtop, Jim Black on drums, and Krauss) plus an additional five-member ensemble conducted by Skuli Sverrisson. Best known as a member of the legendary group Sexmob, Krauss explores otherworldly sounds and sonic textures with composed passages as well as structured improvisation in this new work, and Raissnia creates an evocative vocabulary of shifting light forms through a new live cinema performance built from video, film, and slide projections. Additional performers include: Brian Drye, trombone; Peter Evans, trumpet; Michel Gentile. flutes; Mike McGinnis, clarinet: Sarah Schoenbeck. bassoon; and Karen Waltuch, viola.

Annie Gosfield: Daughters of the Industrial Revolution March 4–March 5, 8pm

Inspired by her immigrant grandfather, a junk dealer in the Lower East Side who recycled scrap metal and other byproducts of the industrial age, Gosfield will sample the sounds of metal, machines, and factories, and transform these raw materials into something new. Featuring two ensembles: the Annie Gosfield Ensemble, with Gosfield on sampling keyboard, Roger Kleier on electric guitar, and Ches Smith on drums and percussion; and Real Quiet with Felix Fan on cello, piano by Andrew Russo, and guest percussionist Alex Lipowski. Also pianist Stephen Gosling performs a selection of Gosfield solos.

An Evening with *Cinema 16* Curated by Molly Surno March 8, 7pm

In this evening of film and live music, Cinema 16 pairs five short films with a specially commissioned score by New York experimental rock band Psychic Ills. These films address the dialogue between repression and sexual expression/freedom. Psychic Ills will compose an original live score to Ron Rice's Chumlum, Beryl Sokoloff & Crita Grauer's Necromancia, John E Schmitz's The Voices, Lichter Peter's Light Sleep, and Raymonde Carasco's Gradiva Sketch I.

Vicky Shick: Not Entirely Herself March 16-19, 8pm

Vicky Shick presents a new dance landscape in which

three women intersect and try to make sense of the delicate order and imagined narrative of their world. Working with her long-time collaborator, visual artist Barbara Kilpatrick, who has created costumes that also function as set, Shick offers a dance piece that is intimate and gigantic, meticulous and wacky. Featuring dancers: Marilyn Maywald, Jimena Paz, Maggie Thom; and coda with guest, Neil Greenberg, and Vicky Shick. Set and costume design by Barbara Kilpatrick. Sound design and performance by Elise Kermani with lighting by Chioe Brown.

Shame the Devil Curated by Petrushka Bazin March 17–April 30 Opening Reception: Thursday, March 17, 6-8pm

Inspired by the parallel ability of both the stand-up comedian and the artist to play the role of cultural observer and provacateur, this exhibition presents new sculpture, video, installation, and photography by artists, who strategically examine, with their frank observations and dry wit, the socio-political dimensions of power associated with cultural, racial, and economic issues. Artists include Elizabeth Axtman, Michael Paul Britto, Jessica Ann Peavy, My Barbarian, and Kenya (Robinson), among others.

BOMBlog 1:15 An Evening with BOMB March 22, 7pm

How much text can a reader absorb in one minute and fifteen seconds? The average online reader spends just that amount of time reading an article on and BOMBlog, which averages 1,500 words. Is this reading or something else entirely? The ephemeral nature of online content has been discussed ad nauseam, but what's often left out of the conversation is the effect that such fleeting encounters with culture have on consciousness, on the inner life that has always been the basis of creativity.
