This whole city shifts, turns, rearranges itself. All the time. And it rearranges us, loosing itself in double light, I observe a new mechanics in this play of night and light, I am the wild machinist, past destroyed, reconstructing the present ... (In the play, spoken by Tak)

Here I am and am no I. This circle in all, this change changing in winterless, a dawn circle with an image of, an autumn change with a change of mist. Mistake two pictures, one and another. No. Only in seasons of short light, only on dead afternoons. I will not be sick again. (In the play, spoken by June)

Dhalgren is a difficult work. In part because it is ultimately far more vast than its binding conveys. This is true of any book capable of colonizing the imagination. But I maintain, Dhalgren is something singular. It took me a long time to read. I struggled with it and slowly realized that even that experience — the struggle of reading — was somehow also part of the book. In the course of adapting the novel I have read it seven times cover to cover. Dhalgren was published in 1975 and has gone through multiple printings since then. I return again and again to the pages of this book-world and am continually surprised, appalled, brought to laugh, moved. If I could read the way dynamite explodes I could devour it whole—instead of being devoured. Instead I continually find passages that I have no memory of having ever read. Bellona, Destroyer of Cities is an ongoing reflection—thought through the space and the grammar of the theater.

William Gibson, in his foreword to *Dhalgren*, describes Bellona as a "recombinant city...a metaphoric Middle American streetscape, transfigured by some unspecified thing or process, where nothing remains quite as it was." In the Roman pantheon, Bellona is the goddess of war, the destroyer of cities. *Dhalgren*, for me, is a book about a city that is caught forever in a terrible loop. In this city that keeps rearranging itself and its inhabitants, the disaster has already happened and we are doomed to live out its aftermath for an eternity—or at least until Kid finishes editing her poetry. *Bellona*, *Destroyer of Cities* unfolds like a time-lapse motion portrait of a city and its people caught up in a permanent revolution, socially, sexually, racially.

Better those landscapes where terror is experienced as terror and rage as rage than this, where either is merely a pain in the gut or a throb above the eye, where a nerve spasm in the shin crumbles a city of bone, where a twitch in the eyelid detonates both the sun and the heart.

BIOS

Jay Scheib's (Director/Adapter/Media Designer) current and upcoming productions include Evan Ziporyn's new opera A House in Bali at Cal Performances in Berkley and Brooklyn Academy of Music (Fall 2010. Next Wave Festival), Puntila und sein Knecht Matti at Theater Augsburg in Germany, and Fidelio at Saarländische Staatstheater in Saarbrücken, Germany (Winter 2011). Recent productions include the Obie Awardwinning Untitled Mars (This Title May Change) (PS 122/NY; National Theatre in Budapest, Hungary), This Place is a Desert (ICA/Boston, Under the Radar Festival/Public Theater), and Addicted to Bad Ideas, Peter Lorre's 20th Century (world tour). International works include the world premiere of Irene Popovic's opera Mozart Luster Lustik in Belgrade, Serbia and Lothar Trolle's Ein Vormittag in der Freiheit and Fernesehen 2, at the Volksbühne, Berlin, Germany. Scheib has been a regular guest professor of acting and directing at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria and the Norwegian Theater Academy. He is Associate Professor of Music and Theater Arts at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Samuel R. Delany (Author of Dhalgren) has won four Nebula Awards, two Hugo Awards, and the William Whitehead Memorial Award for his lifetime contribution to lesbian and gay writing. Born and raised in New York City's Harlem in 1942, he is a professor of English and creative writing at Temple University, where he is Director of the Graduate Creative Writing Program. Delany's novels include Nova (1968), Dhalgren (1975), Trouble on Triton (1976), and The Mad Man (1995). He is author of the fourbook series, Return to Nevèrÿon (1979-87), and the short novel Phallos (2004). His most recent novel, Dark Reflections (2008), won the 2008 Stonewall Book Award and was a runner up for that year's Lambda Literary Award. His stories have been collected in Aye, and Gomorrah, and Other Stories (2002) and Atlantis: Three Tales (1995). His nonfiction volumes include The Jewel-Hinged Jaw (1977-rev. 2009), About Writing: Seven Essays, Three Letters, and Five Interviews (2006), and Times Square Red, Times Square Blue (1998). A further collection of his interviews has appeared in the University of Mississippi Press's Conversations with Samuel R. Delany (2009), edited by Carl Freedman. His new novel Through the Valley of the Nest of Spiders is forthcoming this November from Alvson Books.

Tanya Selvaratnam (Producer/Cast: Captain Kamp/Mrs. Richards) started her professional acting career as a back-up dancer for performance artist John Fleck. Since then, she has performed around the world in productions by The Wooster Group, The Builders Association, and husband Jay Scheib. Tanya has completed residencies at Yaddo and Blue Mountain Center and presented her solo work at Lincoln Center, Tonic, and Issue Project Room. She has appeared in film and video projects directed by Zoe Beloff, Candice Breitz, Andrea Geyer, Sharon Hayes, John Malpede, Jennifer Reeves, and Carrie Mae Weems. As a producer, her most recent films are Chiara Clemente's *Our City Dreams* and Catherine Gund's *What's On Your Plate?*. Tanya's next production is a documentary series from HERE, supported by the Rockefeller Cultural Innovation Fund, about New Yorkers in the performing arts.

Carrie Mae Weems (Photography/Video) is considered one of the most influential contemporary American artists. Her earliest documentary photographic series are Family Pictures and Stories (1978-1984), Ain't Jokin' (1987-1988), Colored People (1989-1990), and the Kitchen Table series (1990). A commission to investigate a body of historical photo-images of blacks from the Getty Museum in 1995 led to an extension of this interest in the diaspora in the series From Here I Saw What Happened and I Cried. In 1997, she began a trilogy of large-scale fabric installations that resulted in Ritual & Revolution (1998), commissioned by the Whitney Museum of American Art, The Jefferson Suite (1999), commissioned by the Santa Barbara Museum of Art, and The Hampton Project (2000), commissioned by the Williams College Museum of Art. Coming Up for Air (2004), her first video endeavor, screened at the Museum of Modern Art in New York City. Among her many awards are The Rome Prize Fellowship, Skowhegan Medal in Photography, and Anonymous Was a Woman Award.

ArKtype (Tour Producer) was established in 2006 under the direction of producer Thomas O. Kriegsmann to support emerging and established artists worldwide in the strategic development, production, and touring of innovative new work. The company is currently represented in the US and beyond with Jay Scheib (Cambridge, MA); Yael Farber/The Farber Foundry (South Africa); T.P.O. (Italy); Peter Brook/CITC (Paris); Phantom Limb (New York); CiRCA (Brisbane); Superamas (France / Austria); Jessica Blank & Erik Jensen (Brooklyn); Stalker / Marrageku (Sydney); World/Inferno Friendship Society's ADDICTED TO BAD IDEAS (Brooklyn); Rude Mechs (Austin, TX); KMA (London); and Aurélia's Oratorio directed by Victoria Thiérrée-Chaplin (France), as well as producing the Baryshnikov Arts Center / Ringling International Arts Festival in Sarasota, FL.

Oana Botez-Ban (Costume Designer), a native of Romania, has designed for major theater and dance companies including The National Theater of Bucharest. Since 1999, her New York costume collaborations in theater and dance include Robert Woodruff, Richard Foreman, Maya Beiser, Evan Ziporyn, Richard Schechner, Annie-B Parson & Paul Lazar, Blanka Zizka, Brian Kulick, Zelda Fichlander, Karin Coonrod, Gus Solomon Jr., among others. Princess Grace Recipient, NEA/TCG Career Development Program 2009-2011.

Sarita Choudhury (Cast: Kid) began acting in film with Mira Nair's Mississippi Masala and Kama Sutra...then joined Cheek by Jowl in the UK and toured with them for a year in Much Ado About Nothing. She continued with theater work at the New Group and The Play Company while continuing filmwork in Gloria, Perfect Murder, War Within, Lady in the Water and others and appearing in TV shows including Kings, Law and Order, The Philanthropist, Damages, and Mercy. "After working with Jay Scheib in This Place is a Desert, I am so happy to be back in his world of fun, postmodern crazy art."

Caleb Hammond (Cast: Tak/Mr. Richards) is a theater and visual artist. Performance roles include: *Untitled Mars*, Jay Scheib, dir. (PS122 and the National Theater of Hungary), *This Place is a Desert*, Scheib, dir. (Under The Radar Festival/The Public Theater), Daniel Veronese's *Women Dreamt Horses*, Scheib, dir. (PS122). Recent original works as a writer/director include: *1000 Wolves* (Ontological Theater in St Mark's), *SICK* (Ontological and the Underground Zero Festival).

Miranda k Hardy (Lighting Designer) is a visual artist and light designer based in Brooklyn, NY. *Bellona* is the second event she has collaborated on with Jay Scheib. She is a member of the performance by design collective TENT, has company affiliations with Banana Bag & Bodice and Latitude 14 as well as being a co-founder of tinyelephant, a studio dedicated to the performing object.

Mikéah Ernest Jennings (Cast: Nightmare/Paul Fenster/George Harrison) is 28% real, 10% recycled plastics, 42% imagined circumstances colliding with ubiquitous terrestrial matter and discarded tires. The remainder is packing peanuts and hair gel: *The Shipment* (Wexner Center, The Kitchen), dir: Young Jean Lee; S.O.S. (The Kitchen, REDCAT), *The House of No More* (DTW, Wexner Center), *Flicker* (REDCAT), dir: Big Art Group/Caden Manson. Next up, Mikéah continues to tour internationally as a member of the Young Jean Lee Theater Company and Big Art Group/Caden Manson.

Peter Ksander (Scenic Designer) is a sculptor and stage designer. Previous work with Jay Scheib include designs for: *Untitled Mars* (this title may change) for which he won an Obie Award, *This Place is a Desert, Women Dreamt Horses*, and the lighting for *A House in Bali* and *Making of Americans*. Other recent designs include: *Oh What War, Geometry, Laude in Urbis, Monstrosity, The Last Cargo Cult, Measure for Measure, The County of Kings*, and *The Archery Contest*. He is a curator for the Ontological Hysteric Incubator and in 2005 was a recipient of the NEA/TCG Career Development Program.

Catherine McCurry (Sound Designer) is a theater artist and musician, trained as a classical violinist, composer and singer. She graduated from MIT in 2007 where she studied physics and music. In 2008 she was awarded a Fulbright grant to pursue Multimedia Performance Art in Berlin in residency at the Universität der Künste. She has previously worked as an actor, composer and media designer in New York City with Jay Scheib and the Talking Band.

Jon Morris (Cast: Jack/Bobby/Eddy) has created and performed with Fuerzabruta, Cirque du Soleil, The MET, Spymonkey, Diavolo Dance Theatre, the Evidence Room, Ken Roht's Orphean Circus, Fabulous Monsters, Theatre de la Jeune Lune. His company, The Windmill Factory, creates original work from living performance installations to international dance theatre collaborations. William Nadylam (Cast: Dragonlady/Lanya) is an actor, director, and writer based in Paris, France. She recently acted in *For Artists Only*, a play by Nelly Tinder at the Ontological, and the film *Loss Control*, directed by Alexis Savino. Upcoming, Laine will be directing a version of *Jamestown*, a book by Matthew Sharpe.

Kaneza Schaal (Cast: Gladis) manages The Wooster Group's Arts-in-Education program and appears in the new production, VIEUX CARRE. She performs with Elevator Repair Service in The Sun Also Rises and The Sound and The Fury. Schaal was the 2009 recipient of a George C. Wolfe, Princess Grace Award and is a graduate of Wesleyan University.

**Kelly Shaffer** (Stage Manager) received her BFA in Dance Performance and Choreography from New York University's Tisch School of the Arts in 2003. She has been living and working in New York for the last nine and a half years as a freelance stage manager and cookie maven.

April Sweeney (Cast: Risa/Milly) has performed internationally in Argentina, Bolivia, Hungary, France, and Ireland. In the United States she has performed in regional theatre, national tours, Off-Broadway, and downtown New York theatre. She has also appeared in films screened at the New York Film Anthology Archive's New Directors' Series, and BAFICI.
