Shame the Devil Curated by Petrushka Bazin March 17–April 30

Opening Reception: Thursday, March 17, 6-8pm
Inspired by the parallel ability of both the stand-up comedian and the artist to play the fole of cultural observer and provacateur, this exhibition presents new sculpture, video, installation, and photography by artists, who strategically examine, with their frank observations and dry wit, the socio-political dimensions of power associated with cultural, racial, and economic issues. Artists include Elizabeth Axtman, Michael Paul Britto, Jessica Ann Peavy, My Barbarian, and Kenya (Robinson), among others.

Steven Reker: People Get Ready March 31-April 2, 8pm

In this new performance work, musician and choreographer Steven Reker crafts a mix-tape of movement pieces scored live by his band, People Get
Ready. Teasing out points of connection between
contemporary dance and indie music, the group
creates sonic landscapes inhabited by dancers from

21C Liederabend op. 2 Thursday-Saturday, April 7-9, 8pm

An ambitious multi-media festival of boundary-pushing, post-classical song featuring the brightest rising young stars as well as beloved, well-known composers of New York City's contemporary music scene. Over three evenings, twenty-one composers, encompassing an explosive array of styles, will present new work alongside newly commissioned films, video projections, and sculptural lighting design. Features eight world-premieres by Daniel Felsenfeld, Peter Golub, David T. Little, Matt Marks, Missy Mazzoli, Paola Prestini, Kamala Sankaram and a commissioned song-cycle by Du Yun.

MGM Grand: NUT

Wednesday-Friday, April 20-22, 7:30pm and 9:30pm MGM Grand (Modern Garage Movement) is an (un)disciplined art dance group, started as a threesome in a one-car garage in California. Since 2005, MGM has taken themselves on the road, transforming non-traditional spaces into arenas for audience-mobilizing dances: garages, galleries, shops, schools, movie theaters, streams, and valleys. MGM Grand is Biba Bell, Jmy Leary, Piage Martin, and R McNeill.

Michael Paul Britto and Kenya (Robinson) Friday-Saturday, April, 29-30, 8pm

In conjunction with the exhibition Shame the Devil, The Kitchen presents these shared evenings of performance by participating artists Michael Paul Britto presents This Little Word of Mine, a multimedia performance project investigates the use and misuse of the "N" word in music, media, and everyday language by imaginatively repurposing call-and-response forms drawn from African-American religious traditions. Kenya (Robinson) debuts YOURMAMADONTWEARNODRAWS, a suite of live solo performances, exploring related themes in which she cycles through a repertoire of new and revised performance works using sound, movement, video, impersonation, and improvisation.

Biographies

Ugly Duckling Presse (UDP) is a non-profit art and publishing organization whose mission is to produce artisanal and trade editions of new poetry, translation, experimental non-fiction, performance texts and books by artists. With a core of volunteer editorial collective of artists and writers, UDP grew out of a 1990s zine into a small Brooklyn-based press that has published more than 200 titles to date with an editorial office and letterpress workshop in the Old American Can Factory in Gowanus. Favoring emerging, international and "forgotten" writers, the company's books, chapbooks, artist's books, broadsides and periodicals often contain handmade elements, calling attention to the labor and history of bookmaking.

Erica Baum received a B.A. in Anthropology from Barnard College, Columbia University and an M.F.A. in Photography from the Yale School of Art. She has exhibited in New York, Baltimore, San Francisco and Kansas City. Internationally, Baum has exhibited in Germany (Berlin), Italy (Milan), Sweden (Mälmo) and Greece (Athens). Her work was included in the book Vitamin Ph: New Perspectives in Photography (Phaidon Press, 2006). She was a 2008 fellow in Photography from the New York Foundation for the Arts. Most recently, her project *Dog Ear* was exhibited at Bureau, New York, and has just been published in book form by UDP. She lives and works in New York City.

Yevgeniy Fiks is a Moscow-born New York-based artist. His work deals with the post-Soviet condition, Soviet-American relations and the Cold War, Modernism, history of the 20th Century Communist Movement, and the Communist legacy in the Western world today. Fiks is represented by Winkleman Gallery in New York and Galerie Blue Square in Paris. His book *Moscow* is forthcoming from UDP.

Kristen Kosmas is a writer and performer. Her plays and solo performances have been produced in Seattle, Austin, Boston, Chicago, and in New York City at venues including PS 122, Dixon Place, Little Theater, Barbes and the Ontological/Hysteric Downstairs Series. As an actor, Kosmas has appeared in many plays including Mark Smith by Kate Ryan, The Internationalist by Anne Washburn, ASTRS and Some Things Cease To Be While Others Still Are by Karinne Keithley, How To Act by Jim Strahs, Playstation Levels 1-4 by Judy Elkan, The Florida Project by Tory Vazquez and Hurricane by Erin Cressida Wilson. This summer Kosmas will be in residence at the Invisible Dog Art Center to work on her play There, There, based on a minor character from Chekhov's Three Sisters.

No Collective makes music performances, which explore and "problematize" both the conceptual and material infrastructures of music and performance. Their new book *CONCERTOS*, which describes and prescribes, in the form of a playscript, the performance of three works previously performed on the same August day in 2008. *CONCERTOS* is the second book in the Emergency Playscripts series from UDP.

Kim Rosenfield is a poet and psychotherapist. She is the author of *Good Morning—Midnight*— (Roof Books), *Tràma* (Krupskaya), and *re: evolution* (Les Figues Press). Rosenfield has published and performed extensively in the U.S. and in Europe. She has collaborated with visual artists Jean Foos, Cheryl Donegan, Yedda Morrison, and with choreographer Sally Silvers.

Get as close as you like: stay in your seat, enter the evolving installation, come and go, or linger for hours to witness exquisite moments of performance appear and disappear, the way you might glimpse a rare bird or a flash of lightening in a real forest.
