

INSTALLATIONS IN THE KITCHEN CENTER FOR VIDEO AND MUSIC

February 25 through March 11, Tuesday through Saturday, 1-6 The Kitchen Center for Video and Music will present a video installation by Vito Acconci.

"This is written at the beginning, during the first stages of thinking about the piece. What I want is a piece 'on the move'—not so much an 'installation,' with its feeling of permanence and adaptation, but a kind of 'quick fit' (keep all the senses of that word). So let's take something in from the outside: throw it in, lay it over, put it down: a group of mobile units that can be joined together and then, in turn, booked into the space itself—like the cars of a train coupled together and running through the space ('I walk the line'—Okay, so who rides and who's left walking?). These mobile units are housing units (a TV set for every household—video babies, TV generation, war baby—easy come, easy go—now you see it, now you don't). To find a theme we need a lot of names—a string of titles to go alongside those train—like units(For example: The Invasion of New York and the Protection of Monogamous Sex'...but don't stop there, keep it coming...who comes first in a situation like this?...)"

March 21–28 Tuesday through Saturday, 1–6, The Kitchen Center for Video and Music will present an installation by Lesley Schiff, entitled, "Saturn, Planet of the Moons."

"Saturn, Planet of the Moons," will be a video installation. A static monitor will be connected to a telescope. The artist mimics the planet, approaches it by zooming in with radio noise and music. The installation will include four color monitors and one large image, a quick copy of looking for the planet Saturn.
