She is currently a PhD candidate in the department of Performance Studies at NYU, writing her dissertation and teaching a course on contemporary experimental choreography.

Elizabeth Hart is a New York-based musician and dancer. Hart is the bassist for PSYCHIC ILLS with whom she tours internationally and in the United States. *The Wire* magazine's Byron Coley describes PSYCHIC ILLS as having, "A fine sound, a young sound, a sound you should get to know today." Elizabeth is also a member of the improvisational dance and music collective, SKINT, with whom she has performed at The Kitchen (NYC, 2006) and the MOCA Miami (2008). "The authentic and unusually intimate reflection of girls is empowered, is healing... In 'SKINT' they do it all indulging in a symbiosis of club talents." —*Gay City News*. She attended P.A.R.T.S. in Brussels and graduated from the first cycle in 2008. Since then, she has been living and making choreographic work in New York. She engages in an ongoing performative research investigation called Out of and Into with collaborator Moriah Evans as well as other projects. Sarah has worked with choreographers Heather Kravas, Milka Djordjevich, and Kota Yamazaki and the apparatus the Bureau for the Future of Choreography.

Marcos Rosales holds an MFA from the California Institute of the Arts (CalArts) and a BFA from University of North Texas in Denton, TX. He has exhibited work at Las Cienegas Projects in Los Angeles, Steven Wolf Fine Arts in San Francisco, Green on Red Gallery, Dublin and staged performances in various venues in New York. He has worked with choreographers Maria Hassabi and Jeremy Wade. He is currently working on a book of scripts, poems, and other writings related to his visual work and performances.

Alex Waterman's practice researches how music is the social body sounding. Through his work with ensembles, close collaborations with composers, artists and film makers, as well as his own installation works and writings, he has created a body of work that reveals from multiple perspectives how music is not only a means towards creating a gathering of people, but also a powerful means for a social group to read and construct community and meaning together. Alex is presently working on his PhD in musicology at NYU as well as writing a book about the composer Robert Ashley with the artist Will Holder. His writings have been published by *Dot Dot Dot, Paregon, FoArm, BOMB*, and *Artforum*.
