Lauren Amazoen Executive Director SIMONE FORTI is a seminal figure in the world of Post Modern Dance. She began dancing with Anna Halprin in 1955 in the tradition of movement exploration and improvisation. After four years of workshop study and performance apprenticeship with Halprin in San Francisco, Forti moved to New York. There she studied composition at the Merce Cunningham Studio wit musicologist/dance educator Robert Dunn. In the early 1960s, Forti made performance pieces, which she called "dance constructions," which were inspired by photos of the Japanese Gutai Group and proved to be influential in the subsequent development of performance art and dance in New York.

Since the early 1970s, Forti has been evolving a vocabulary of "natural" movement. She has used this improvisational vocabulary in collaborations with various musician/composers, including Charlemagne Palestine, Peter Van Riper, Jon Gibson, and Malcolm Goldstein. In 1986, she formed Simone Forti & Troupe, with whom, for six years, she developed several natural/geologic/historic portraits of specific locations. In her solo work, which she calls "animations," Forti has been developing a dance-narrative form wherein speaking and moving spring spontaneously from a common source, creating cohesive impressions of subjects ranging from world news to the roots of a cabbage plant.

Forti has performed and taught throughout the US, Canada and Europe, as well as in Japan, Australia, and Venezuela, including appearances at the Stedelijk Museum in Amsterdam, Theater 500 in Tokyo, Dancin' City '94 Festival in Copenhagen, Theater Artaud in San Francisco, and in New York at St. Mark's Church, The Kitchen, Dance Theater Workshop, and Judson Church. Since 1991, she has regularly participated in the multimedia artist Nam June Paik's Video Opera performances at venues including the Whitney Museum of Art in New York, the Donaueschinger Festival in Germany, and the Sougetsu Museum in Tokyo.

Forti has received many fellowships over the years, including grants from the Australian Theater Board, the New York State Council on the Arts, the New York Foundation for the Arts, and several from the National Endowment for the Arts, including for the years 1991 and 1992. In 1995 she received a Bessie award for sustained achievement.

Founded in 1992 by artists Julie Carr and Sondra Loring with the support of Movement Research, the IMPROVISATION FESTIVAL/NY is a two-week-long city wide event that includes performances, workshops, jams and rehearsals in dance, spoken word, action theater, and video. It is the goal of the Festival tocreate an arena where the many complex and highly developed dance and performance improvisational forms can be seen, studied, and supported.

Although focusing on dance, the Festival encourages bridging distances between different artistic disciplines by presenting a sampling of genres that have historically influenced dance, i.e., music, visual art, and poetry. This crossover of artistic forms results in an exciting level of growth and exchange for the artists involved and reveals the rich tapestry of the festival as a whole for the audiences.

From its grassroots beginnings the Improvisation Festival/NY has gathered momentum and established itself as an important event for artists and audience members. The Festival links a chain of New York City presenting spaces together through performance, study, criticism, discussion and community interaction.

JULIE CARR is an independent dancer, writer, teacher and performer, has been working in NYC since 1988. She has danced with many choreographers and fellow improvisers including, most recently, KJ Holmes, David Dorfman, and Sondra Loring. She teaches Contact Improvisation and improvisation/writing workshops and also teaches poetry in the public schools. She is co-founder and director/curator of the Improvisation Festival/NY.

SONDRA LORING makes performance, produces dance festivals, edits an underground dance journal and works as a teacher. Loring currently curates with Julie Carr the annual Improvisation Festival/NY. She is the recent recipient of a Rockefeller Foundation/Movement Research Exchange grant to work professionally in Mexico for 2 months in 1996. An evening of her work will be produced by The Danspace Project in April.

STEVE PAXTON was born in Phoenix, AZ, and currently lives in Vermont. He is schooled in modern dance and ballet and has performed with Merce Cunningham Dance Co., Jose Limon Co., Pauline Koner, Pearl Lang, Tamiris-Nagrin, Yvonne Rainer, Trisha Brown, and others. Paxton is a co-founder of the Judson Dance Theater (1962) and of Grand Union (1971).

In 1972, Paxton instigated Contact Improvisation, which continues today as an international network of dancers who convene to practice this form and who publish news and research in *Contact Quarterly* (Northampton, MA), for which Paxton is a contributing editor.

Paxton received a NY "Bessie" award for ongoing chortography in 1987, and has received grants from the NEA, the Rockefeller Foundation, the Contemporary Performance Arts Foundation, and Change Inc. In 1994, he received the Vermont Governor's Award for Excellence in the Arts. In 1995, he received a grant from the Contemporary Performance Arts Foundation and was awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship.
