Nyabinghi Dreamtime utilizes traditional ceremonial music and chants. The movement, choreographed by Jawole Zollar, basd on traditional forms, explores breath rhythms and the synchronicity of individuals in space.

THE COMPANY

urban bush women was established in 1984 by Artistic Director Jawole Willa Jo Zollar. Using contemporary idioms and inter-disciplinary forms, the company has created numerous dance/theater works rooted in the folklore and spiritual traditions of African-Americans. Through movement, live music, and the drama and wit of the spoken word, Urban Bush Women explores the struggle, growth, transformation, and survival of the human spirit and creates a powerful sense of community on stage that speaks to a broad audience. Urban Bush Women also seeks to foster cross-cultural exchange through educational seminars and workshops as well as developmental residencies.

JAWOLE WILLA JO ZOLLAR (JAA-WO-LAY) (Artistic Director) was born and raised in Kansas City, MO and was steeped from childhood in both sacred and secular aspects of popular Black culture. She began her dance training with Joseph Stevenson, a student of the legendary Katherine Dunham. She received a BA in Dance from the University of Missouri at Kansas City and an MFA in Dance from Florida State University where she subsequently taught. In 1980, she emigrated to New York City to study with Dianne McIntyre at Sounds in Motion. Zollar has toured internationally and her work with Urban Bush Women has earned her three

Choreographer's Fellowships from the NEA and another from the New York Foundation for the Arts. Shelter, created by Zollar in 1987, was recently set on the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater and premiered in Kansas City in November 1992, and in New York at City Center in December. She received a 1992 New York Dance & Performance (a/k/a BESSIE) award for her collective work from River Songs through Praise House.

TERRI COUSAR has been with the company since its inception in 1984. Originally from Columbus, OH, she attended Ohio State University's Dance Department where she received a BFA in Dance. Her studies in New York include Afro-Haitian dance with Pat Hall-Smith and West African dance with Yousouff Kombassa.

MAIA CLAIRE GARRISON began her performance career as an acrobat with the Big Apple Circus at the age of ten. Her family then moved to Rome, Italy. There she was given years of training and inspiration from her mother Roberta, who is also a dancer and choreographer. Maia has also presented her own choreography in Dance Theater Workshop's "KUUMBA", curated by Janine Williams, as well as in the 1992 California festival "Black Choreographers Moving Toward the Twenty-First Century." She was last seen performing in collaboration with Junior "Gabu" Wedderburn in Aaron Davis Hall's "Rooted In Our Bones", curated by Donald Byrd. Maia graduated from Sarah Lawrence College in '91.

CHRISTINE KING joined the company in 1989. She is originally from Michigan and has been performing in New York City for the past ten years with a number of artists including Claire Porter, Trinket Monsod, Kaleidoscope Dancers, Amy Sue Rosen, and Black Pearl Dance Company. She has studied with Sara Sugihara, William Adair, Nancy Hutchins, and many other artists whom she gives many thanks for their encouragement and love. She holds a B.A. in Dance and has studied singing with Diane Barclay, Artie Sheppard and others, and enjoys exploring many types of vocal utilizations.

TREVA OFFUTT, a native Clevelander, is a recent graduate of Rhode Island School of Design, and hopes to combine visual and dance components in her career. She would like to thank many people for their support: above all her family and "The Women" for their love and encouragement; art critic Szymon Bojko for his eternal youth and cabaret soul; animator Amy Kravitz for her faith and vision; the people of Karamu and Jacob's Pillow for their patience and spirit; and to the memory of artist/guru Mahler Ryder for his focus and strength

E. GAYNELL SHERROD is a native of Buffalo, NY. Formerly a member of Kariamu & Company in Buffalo as well as Philadelphia's Philadanco, Sherrod is currently an ED.E candidate at Temple University's Dance Department. She is a faculty fellowship scholar, teaches in the department, and is working on research in African derived dance techniques and performance arts.

JUNIOR "GABU" WEDDERBURN grew up drumming in Jamaica and started playing professionally at the age of 14. He began touring at an early age with the National Dance Theater Company of Jamaica throughout North and South America. He studied at the Folk Research Department of the Jamaican School of Music, and then founded the percussion-based band Dominion Percussion. Gabu has also recorded and toured with internationally recognized reggae artists in Jamaica and New York. He has lived in New York since 1984, where he formed Ancient Vibrations with a group of drummers, dancers, and singers. Most recently Gabu composed and recorded the musical score for "Shelter" for the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theatre.

VALERIE WINBORNE "OTUASINA" is a native of Virginia. She remained that way until moving North to attend graduate school in New York. During and after completion of her M.A. in Dance/Movement Therapy, Valerie danced with many choreographers, including Ron Brown, Johanna Boyce, David Rousseve, and Janine Williams while also creating her own work. She gives thanks to those who have taught her along the way especially Marlies Yearby and her mentor Eija Celli. To dance with Urban Bush Women is a dream come true and she thanks her family, especially Wayne, and her friends for their unconditional support.

ANCIENT VIBRATIONS is an ensemble of drummers, dancers, and singers dedicated to keeping alive the African derived rhythms and chants of Jamaican folk religion. Founded in 1986 by Junior "Gabu" Wedderburn, the group performs music and dance that is reflective of Caribbean history. Ancient Vibrations is unique in its performance of traditional Jamaican rituals such as Kumina, Afro-Christian Pocomania, Koromanti, and Tambu. Their concentration on Nyabinghi, the primary influence of contemporary reggae music, reflects the commitment to preserving the Jamaican link with the original anti-colonial Nyabinghi movement in Africa. Ancient Vibrations has performed throughout New York City and the West Coast in a variety of venues, clubs, and festivals, including performances under the auspices of the World Music Institute and the American Museum of Natural History. In addition, Ancient Vibrations has worked with such greats as the Mighty Sparrow and the legendary Skapalites. Ancient Vibration would like to thank Urban Bush Women for their interest and for their understanding of Jamaican traditions and music.

TEDDY "SILAS" DAVIS (Musician) was born in Portland, Jamaica. His first exposure to drum was in the Revival Church. He performed with the Boys Drum Corp, the nationally acclaimed Dominion Percussion, and did Nyabinghi Drumming and studied Diembe with Master Drummers from Guinea. After arriving in New York, he became a founding member of Ancient Vibrations under the direction of Junior "Gabu" Wedderburn. I give thanks to Jah and to spread the word of Rostafari.

FITZGERALD "RAS MENELIK" DACOSTA (Musician), born in Jamaica, started his musical career at the age of seven. At fifteen he played professionally with "Up the People - Movement". At age twenty, he started to play with Soul Syndicate, Augustus Pablo, Heptone, Wackies, Lee Perry, Itopia, and Bob Marley. He gives thanks to the most high, Rastafari.

IRA WILLIAMS (Musician), born in Jamaica, started singing and playing the guitar at the age of six in church. Later he became a member of a folk singing group and started working professionally at the age of fourteen. It was at this time that he made his first recording. He finds great satisfaction in being a professional singer. It's a dream come true.

STEFANI MAR (Costume Designer) is an artist who has worked in different media including performance, sculpture, installation and has created public pieces which have been displayed in New York City parks.

Currently, a work is on view at the CUNY Graduate Center. She has been the recipient of NYSCA Sponsored Project grants for self-initiated projects. Mar has previously designed costumes for Muna Tseng Dance Projects. This is her first effort for the Urban Bush Women.

DON MEISSNER (Composer) is a frequent collaborator with some of New York's most provocative and innovative theatre and dance artists. Most recently his compositions and sound design were featured in Ron Brown's Combat Review/ Witches in Response at P.S. 122 and the Joyce Theater. His music was also featured in David Rousseve's Urban Scenes/Creole Dreams in this season's Next Wave Festival at BAM. He has appeared on stage as composer/performer in the performance pieces of Laurie Carlos at Jacob's Pillow, the

National Black Arts Festival, for En Garde Arts, and the Walker Art Center. Other collaborations have been with Anita Gonzalez, Marlies Yearby, and playwright Leslie Lee at the American Place Theater. He has been an artist-in-residence at the Atlantic Center for the Arts, where he worked with Joan LaBarbara and Woody and Steina Vasulka.

KRISTABELLE MUNSON (Lighting Designer) is from Manila, the Philippines. Munson has created lighting for dance, theater, television, and opera in the Americas and Europe. She is a graduate of SUNY at Purchase. Recent projects include Jennifer Muller/The Works at the Joyce Theater, Ron Brown and Evidence at Performance Space 122, and visual design for Threadwaxing Space featuring concerts by Fundamental and John Lurie. Kristabelle wishes to thank the Urban Bush Women for a fruitful season.

HELEN OJI (Set Designer) is a painter and set designer. She has exhibited her work in numerous solo and group exhibitions, including museums and galleries such as the Museum of Modern Art, The New Museum of Contemporary Art, Nordjyilands Kunstmuseum, Monique Knowlton, Sidney Janis, Artists Space, The Drawing Center, and Pelavin Editions.
