ROY COHN/JACK SMITH: More precisely, Ron Vawter, whose Obie-winning backto-back solo performance as these two antithetically notable New York figures is getting a brief reprise while Jill Godmillow films it. Smith was a flamboyant, anarchic Downtown artist and filmmaker, whose muttered stream-of-consciousness monologues filled endless late-night performances; Cohn, McCarthyite lawyer and political fixer, was an Uptown right-wing slickie. Both men died of AIDS, which is how Vawter, who has it, links the mirrored extremes of their opposing styles. If you haven't seen Vawter immerse himself in this double role, you're missing something marvelous.
