The Anticipated Ruin is a pocket survey of the wide range of issues bracketing the production and contextualization of contemporary art. The work presented by these eleven artists can be seen in part as a response to the resurgence of figuration in the last decade and the attendant acceptance (by an expanded art audience) of the codification of visual culture in terms of received imagery. Appropriation is the focal point of much of the work here, particularly in the extreme form of outright borrowing of other works More importantly, questions concerning how the support system for art appropriates work for its own purposes are raised. By examining the presentation and commodification of the art object, these artists sustain the debate supposedly laid to rest by postmodernism. In doing so, they anticipate a possible future for art built on the ruin of authenticity.
