The Kitchen presents *The Stars Below*, a solo exhibition by Joe Winter, September 8—October 29, 2011

New York, NY, February 14, 2017—**The Kitchen** presents *The Stars Below*, a solo exhibition of new works by New York-based artist **Joe Winter**. Commissioned by The Kitchen, this show is Winter's first solo presentation of work, and continues his study of how commonplace systems of technology and communication relate to space, time and place. Curated by **Matthew Lyons**, the exhibition will be on view from **September 8** through **October 29, 2011**.

The Kitchen's gallery hours are **Tuesday** through **Friday**, **12:00 P.M.** to **6:00 P.M.** and **Saturday**, **11:00 A.M.** to **6:00 P.M.** Admission is free. There will be an opening reception for the exhibition at The Kitchen (512 West 19th Street) on **Thursday**, **September 8** from **6:00 P.M.** to **8:00 P.M.**

In *The Stars Below*, Winter re-imagines the institutional architectures of knowledge transmission and conventions of information display as an exploration of sublime notions like "deep time" within the everyday. The exhibition, which takes its name from a short story by science fiction author Ursula K. Le Guin, reflects Winter's ongoing interest in locating a scientific gaze within the framework of common spaces—the macrocosm in the tedium. Comprised of three works, *The Stars Below* alternately positions the viewer above, below, within and outside the large-scale pieces in the space and plays with the formal parallels and contrasts between astronomic and geologic modes of viewership.

In these works, Winter reconfigures office or school items (dry erase markers and boards, chalk and slate), which are typically temporary and revisable modes of display, with mechanisms that instigate gently destructive actions echoing geological processes such as erosion, sedimentation or metamorphosis. For example, the central work, which is also named *The Stars Below*, features large pieces of slate taken from an old schoolhouse. Over the course of the exhibition, a piece of chalk placed on the slate surfaces will mark the passage of time by their dissolution under gradual drips from the ceiling, creating slowly evolving chalk dust 'nebulae' on the slate panels.

Joe Winter lives and works in Long Island City, NY. His work has been exhibited at venues including Foxy Production (NY), Eyebeam (NY), The Museum of Contemporary Art, San Diego, The Western Front (Vancouver), The Urbis Center (Manchester, UK), Plug.In (Basel), Edith Russ Haus (Oldenburg, Germany) and the Center for Curatorial Studies at Bard College. He has completed residencies at the MacDowell Colony, Eyebeam Center for Art and Technology, Sculpture Space, the Lower Manhattan Cultural Council, and the Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture.
