## The Kitchen presents *Talk Show:* An Evening with *Ugly Duckling Presse* Monday, May 3

New York, NY, April 16, 2010—On Monday, May 3, The Kitchen presents *Talk Show:* An Evening with *Ugly Duckling Presse*. This evening celebrates the release of two new books published by *Ugly Duckling Presse: Ten Walks/Two Talks* and *Made-Up Interviews with Imaginary Artists*. Taking the format of a late night talk show, the event will include interviews, poetry, and unscripted surprises. Andy Fitch and Jon Cotner, authors of *Ten Walks/Two Talks*, will co-host the night, which will feature several guests including Dodie Bellamy, Rachel Levitsky, Matthew Rohrer, Marina Temkina, and interview-artist Alex Stein interviewing Cecilia Vicuña. The event will take place at 7:00 P.M. at The Kitchen (512 West 19<sup>th</sup> Street). Admission is free.

Growing out of the *Ugly Duckling* zine of the early 1990s, *Ugly Duckling Presse* produces small to mid-size editions of new poetry, translations, lost works and artists' books. Created by a group of artists and writers with no prior commercial publishing experience, *Ugly Duckling Presse* has a unique publishing structure with a non-hierarchical editorial structure. The organization resides in a small workshop and letterpress studio to the Old American Can Factory, which houses a community of artists, artisans, and creative enterprises. **Dodie Bellamy**'s chapbook *Barf Manifesto* was named Best Book of 2009, Under 30 Pages by *Time Out New York*. Other books include *Academonia*, *Pink Steam*, *Cunt-Ups*, and *The Letters of Mina Harker*.

**Jon Cotner** is the author, with Andy Fitch, of *Ten Walks/Two Talks*, published by Ugly Duckling Presse this year. He recently completed another project with Fitch called *Conversations over Stolen Food*. He lives in New York City.

**Matthew Rohrer** is the author of six books of poetry. Ugly Duckling Presse published his most recent work, A PLATE OF CHICKEN. This year, Rohrer has been involved in residencies and

performances at the Henry Art Gallery in Seattle and the Museum of Modern Art in New York City. He teaches at New York University and lives in Brooklyn.

Alex Stein is the author of *Made-Up Interviews With Imaginary Artists* (Ugly Duckling Presse, 2009) and of *Weird Emptiness* (Wings Press, 2007). He lives in Boulder, Colorado.

**Marina Temkina** is a poet and artist. Ugly Duckling Presse published her most recent work, *What Do You Want*, in 2009. *What Do You Want* is comprised mostly of texts written as installations for public spaces. Marina has authored four poetry books in Russian, and published two artist books in collaboration with Michel Gerard. She received National Endowment for the Arts in 1994.

**Cecilia Vicuña** is a Chilean poet and artist but based in New York since 1980. She performs and exhibits around the world—Europe, Latin America and the United States. Her visual work has been shown at the Whitney Museum Biennial and the Museum of Modern Art in New York. She is the author of many books, including: *Instan* (Kelsey St), *El Templo* (Situations), *Cloud-Net* (Art in General), *QUIPOem* (Wesleyan), and *Unravelling Words & the Weaving of Water* (Graywolf).
